The holiday season of 2015 is a big one! The FAA and many retail stores predict nearly 1 million drones enter the airspace, and we want to make sure you're ready!

What are the Rules?

As of December 2015 the FAA has yet to set full regulations on recreational UAV's (Unmanned Aerial Vehicle). However, guidelines and safety instructions include:

- Fly Below 400 feet and remain clear of obstacles.
- Keep the aircraft within a visual line of sight at all times.
- Don't operate your drone under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Do not fly within 5 miles of an airport without contacting the control tower first.
- Don't fly near crowded areas.
- Register your drone at faa.gov/uas/registration
